



### From Cllr Louise Wainwright

I am delighted and humbled in equal measure to have been elected as your County Councillor with the responsibility of representing 16 parishes across a region known as the 'Salcombe Division.'

I offer my genuine respect to all those voted in the local government elections irrespective of the candidate they supported. I regret that politics interferes with local government elections where I believe the focus should be in the best person for the job, capable of exploring and developing local solutions for local problems. I will work closely with District Councillors to deliver the best possible services within the severe budgetary constraints that face us.

As demand increases and budget cuts bite even more, we can expect difficult times ahead. Community spirit, volunteers and charitable groups will continue to bridge funding gaps in their local communities. Local endeavour helps to build community resilience and local pride and be a joyful way of bringing together all sectors of the parish. I will use my Locality Fund to support these endeavours.

The lack of affordable housing and the high level of part-time residents was a concern voiced during my intensive canvassing campaign. I warmly invite part-time residents to take a more active role in their local communities by attending local events, helping to organise new local gatherings and joining local clubs and societies. This will both bring a dynamic experience to their enjoyment of the wonderful area where they have chosen to live and build stronger relationships with permanent residents.

Part-time residents contribute twice as much council tax to local government budgets. I want to explore how these additional funds might benefit local community needs before being absorbed into the general fund. This will require parish councils to have a more dynamic communication system capable of genuinely measuring and articulating local needs to local government. I want to assist in this process if needed.

Let's meet at your monthly parish council meetings. More people need to show a genuine interest in strengthening the ability of parish councils to represent the interests of their local communities. I want to help build the ability of all parishes to become 'unitary-ready' within the next three years when we will no longer benefit from the services of our District and County Councils and Councillors. The process of local government reorganisation will mean that

communities will rely more heavily on their town and parish councils to represent their views and reliably communicate these to the new Unitary Authority.

I am exploring innovative ways of piloting the delivery of rural road repairs through well-resourced local hubs of qualified local farmers in a possible farm diversification programme. I will share more information as these discussions develop. I will spend more time with our Highways Officer to support his role in prioritising the programme of works.

I will be developing a comprehensive digital communication platform in my role as your County Councillor using my experience as former parish magazine editor. I am looking forward to playing an active role in optimising the services available from local government and building the resilience of our parishes in the Salcombe Division.

A visit to the Falkland Islands in 1992 was to report on the war there through the eyes of the children, who largely remembered it as a time of excitement, unlike their parents. We also learned of some strange tribal customs in deepest Brazil as a new baby was introduced to the local community. There was scary filming on board an aircraft carrier and Matt Baker in a dangerous aerial stunt much higher than intended which ended in a nailbiting landing.

We had the impression that these exploits would be much harder to replicate now in this age of Health and Safety, but we were full of admiration to Alex and the crews who, it seems, would turn their hands to any endeavour for the entertainment of our children.

### **National Trust South Hams Centre**

The April coach trip to Tavistock and Cotehele was greatly enjoyed by our members. This is a popular combination, with a late-morning visit to the ancient stannary town, followed by an afternoon at the NT's extensive property at Cotehele, over the border in Cornwall. Fortunately, it was fine weather and the gardens looked lovely with the Spring blossom and tulips in full flower.

The house at Cotehele is a rambling granite and slatestone home, high above the River Tamar. It was built by the Edgcumbes and remained in the family for nearly 600 years. The hall, with its displays of weaponry, and the warren of tapestry-clad rooms beyond have changed little since Tudor times. It is also well worth while going down to Cotehele Quay where you'll find the 1899 Tamar sailing barge "Shamrock."

Our most recent outing was to Sutton Mead, a privately owned garden at Moretonhampstead on the edge of Dartmoor. We were fortunate to have perfect weather and the garden, opened by the owners in aid of the Devon National Garden Scheme, was lovely. All the different rhododendrons and azaleas were looking particularly stunning.

On Friday 13th June the outing is Sidmouth. This picturesque seaside town nestles beneath majestic Triassic red cliffs and the green hills of the glorious Sid valley. ## Malborough Village Hall & Playing Fileds Association

At our AGM on 7th May we celebrated the end of a busy year for the Village Hall. The Chairman expressed his gratitude to everyone on the committee, especially the five people standing down this year.

We rely on the income from our hirers to ensure we have sufficient funds to keep things running and to ensure the facilities are up to scratch for all our users. So, thank you to all those of you who use the hall for whatever purpose, thank you for supporting us and for continuing to ensure that the Hall and the Fields are relevant and valued.

This year the hall and the grounds have been used for:

- Barn Dances, Bingo and BBQs to raise money for a variety of local causes
- · Our stunning annual bonfire and fireworks display
- We have been the venue for a variety of cultural events put on by MAD and KATs and the Stanbrough Chorus
- We have accommodated the elections and the flu and covid vaccinations

- We are thrilled to support the Malborough Parish Council who have set up the new Malborough Youth Group in the Hall
- We have seen all our sporting activities grow from the rapid expansion of KM United as more young people get involved, particularly more girls, growing numbers of people taking up tennis as well as the growing popularity of Pickleball and our regulars such as Pilates now joined by the more energetic Clubbercise

It is important to us that the facilities are run for and by local people so that they are safe and enjoyable for everyone. This year we have done a lot of improvements both inside and out:

- Last summer was the first year we had our wildflowers
  which were beautiful we were supported by the
  National Trust who supplied the seeds, this is a longterm project which we hope will grow in strength each
  year
- We have also been very pleased to work with SMASH (Sustainable Malborough and South Huish) who provided us with more than 400 young whips which a working party of local volunteers planted along the Salcombe Road boundary and by the play area to renew our hedging
- The Local History group put up the new History Board outlining the history of the village
- And we are supporting a small group of young people who of their own accord started making a cycle track in the woods – we will be working with them to make sure it is safe and fun – this is their village, their space and we are delighted that they want to use outside space and make it their own
- We have also added outside lighting and CCTV to keep everyone safe
- KM Utd work with the Football Association who inspect our pitches, and thanks to the efforts of KM working with the Management Committee to agree a mutually agreeable schedule of works, we are delighted that the FA have just inspected and found great improvement since their last inspection 3 years ago

We have also spent considerable time, energy and resource this year improving the safety and comfort of our inside spaces:

- We have installed new heaters and air conditioning units in the Hall and the Annexe
- · We have new lighting in the Hall and the Kitchens
- We have a new fire alarm system and fire and heat detectors throughout the building as well as a range of other upgrades to ensure the building remains safe for everyone
- We also have a new website to make booking easier and smoother for everyone and a dedicated phone for the bookings

Looking ahead to next year, our biggest project will be undertaken in conjunction with the Parish Council. We are hoping to expand the car park, to create a multi-use games area, a new facility for bike riders and a new adult gym area. This is a huge project, and we will share the details as they become available and of course we will minimise disruption to those using the facilities while the upgrades take place.

All of this will take a huge amount of energy on the part of the committee and the many partners with whom we work. We desperately need people who are willing to sit on the committee, but also those willing to participate in working groups or take a lead in specific areas such as fund raising or social media as we try to continue to stay relevant and to stay central to the life of our village.

### The National Trust



The beautiful weather has been a great help for the wildflowers and invertebrates with lots of butterflies on the wing compared to the slow start last year. Look out for painted ladies that have migrated up from North Africa which are being seen in good numbers around the coast. There are also green hairstreak, wall

brown and the more common small tortoiseshell and red admiral to enjoy as you walk the footpaths.

The Rangers are busy strimming the footpaths as the growing season is well underway. If you notice any paths that need attention do let us know as we look after many miles of paths! Early in the season when the first flowering plants are out we do our best to leave wildflowers to set seed before cutting them as they are an important early nectar source for may insects including bumble bees.

The team have also completed a path diversion in Tor Woods near Overbecks drive. This is due to the extensive amount of Ash dieback in the woods. We have moved the permissive path which means the mature trees can decay and die without being a risk to walkers; they will become great habitat for bats, woodpeckers and fungi.

The wildflowers on Bolberry Down are looking great again this year. The plots sown with seed are now starting to spread out into the down and increase the diversity of this area of grassland. We all enjoy seeing and hearing the skylarks that nest on the Down – they are ground nesting birds, so please help them raise their chicks by keeping to the paths and keeping dogs away from the long grass. We are lucky to have lots of great skylark habitat in this area but nationally they are declining and need our help.

The new footpath from East Soar car park to East Soar Outdoor Experience is being used. The oak gates are handmade so were a bit delayed but the volunteers are now working hard to install them. Thanks again to the National Trust South Hams Supporters Centre for funding the gates.

# Sustainable Malborough And South Huish / Wild About Malborough

At our SMASH Meeting last Monday, it was agreed unanimously to form a new group encouraging sustainability and biodiversity alongside but not affiliated to SMASH. The new group would act independently from but in consultation and cooperation with Malborough Parish Council. The new organisation would go by the name of 'Wild About Malborough' and would be open to all like minded people in our community.

The first action would be to encourage the growth of all the new saplings planted this year in the hedgerow along the Salcombe road bank of the VH carpark. We will also continue to nurture the replacement whips planted in the Malborough Wood. This will take place on Saturday 31st May at 10:00 meeting by the VH. All volunteers welcome.

We will continue to create more wildflower areas where appropriate. Suggestions were:

- The corner outside the entrance to the Playing Field
- · Around the Malborough sign coming into the village
- · The green by The Pound.

We will check with the relevant people.

Following the successful Beach Clean at Soar Mill Cove it was proposed that we do a clean at South Milton Sands. We would consult with Gary from Till The Coast Is Clear and the National Trust on that one.

Finally it was decided to offer to help research and plan for EV chargers at the Village Hall. Tony will talk to the new VH Committee and the PC about what will almost certainly be an essential part of future-proofing facilities for the local community.

Addendum: Later on in the week a few of us met with District Councillor Mark Long and landowner Scott Rossiter down at the Orchard next to Eastercombes. There was an extremely useful discussion on how to improve the area which is a local amenity site. It was resolved to draw up a plan with all the trees marked out.

Any dead or badly damaged saplings would be replaced by Scott. He also volunteered to cut some paths and clearings, yet to be designated and to also do 2 annual cuts at suitable times to encourage the wild flowers. There are already abundant flowers there including some lovely orchids and we all agreed it could be a beautiful space.



### **Feoffees Report**

Malborough Feoffees is the second oldest charity in Devon (1573) and one of the eighty earliest to be found in England and Wales. It once owned a large number of properties in Malborough and Salcombe including several in Higher and Lower Town.

One of the main beneficiaries was a Mr Dyer who owned what is now Oldestones in Chapel Lane. This was run as Dyers School. Boys' classes were on one floor and girls' upstairs. The families paid 1 old penny a day! When Malborough School was built on what was the Rectory Field, pupils were transferred there and Dyers School became a private house. The name Dyer lives on in one of the cottages in Lower Town!

The charity was set up to help the poor, improve education and aid the parish church. All except one of the properties have now been sold and the proceeds invested. The interest is used annually to help local people. This last year we were able to help fund 10 emergency lifelines and 7 students in Higher Education.

To help tidy up this area we have agreed to make good any problems in the bus shelter and generally spruce it up with a coat of masonry paint outside and regular cleaning. If you use the shelter to wait for the bus or just to watch the world go by please make sure you put all your litter in the adjacent bin!
